
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Anthony Rizzi (a distinguished physicist who solved an 80 year old problem in Einstein's theory) is a man of science and faith. In this readily accessible book, he makes clear that there is a necessary connection, established by God, between real science and true faith. Indeed, man cannot be who he is made to be without both, as a bird cannot fly without both wings.

In this first-of-its-kind book, Rizzi responds to Pope John Paul II's call to reunite science and the Faith. John Paul II's encyclical Fides et Ratio calls for a return to sound reasoning with St. Thomas Aquinas as our model. The Holy Father identifies scientism, the misunderstanding of science, as a key cultural problem. Indeed, it is the intellectual root of our moral, political, and theological problems. Christ tells us "For this I was born, for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth." Pilate asked, "What is truth?" New discoveries of science cause people to ask this question with increasing urgency.

From his unique view as an accomplished scientist, Rizzi establishes firm footing for the reader to defend truth in our scientistic culture, revealing the proper grounding for science and Faith. The reader journeys through fascinating territory in which solid answers to modern quandaries are laid. What is a man? Does an animal think? Will a robot ever be able to think? Is it truly Galileo vs. St. Thomas? Are there an infinite number of universes? How do we as faithful Catholics discuss topics such as the Big Bang, time travel and evolution?

With the same keen eye, Rizzi re-presents St. Thomas's certain proofs for the existence of God. He uses modern examples and convincingly settles common modern difficulties. Throughout the book, Rizzi tackles thought -provoking questions like Einstein's query about whether God could have made a different universe...
