

Anthony Rizzi (a distinguished physicist who solved an 80 year old problem with Einstein's theory) is uniquely qualified to address our scientific culture, having come to his own intellectual crisis point. In The Science Before Science he answers these questions in a lucid style, peppered with personal and historical anecdotes, accessible to every educated reader.

Fifteen years ago this summer, the Voyager 2 spacecraft became the first and is still the only manmade object to reach Neptune. The spacecraft passed a mere 3000 miles from the planet! Voyager's precise arrival reminds us of Newton's laws that were used to weave its way there via Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus. Newton's laws were the foundation of a revolution in science and in our thinking about the world. Voyager represents the good side of this revolution. Meanwhile, the newspapers also ring with news illustrating the misuse of science, from cloning to hidden (and even explicit) assertions that science has no need of God or any truly human purpose. Since science is knowing, all such things are then forced to be mere opinions.

From his unique view as an accomplished scientist, Rizzi establishes firm footing for the reader to defend truth in our scientistic culture, revealing the proper grounding for science and faith. The reader journeys through fascinating territory in which solid answers to modern quandaries are laid.

What is a man? Will Scientists ever make a man? Does an animal think? Will a robot ever be able to think? Is it truly Galileo vs. Christianity? Are there an infinite number of universes? What is the meaning of the Big Bang? What of time travel and evolution? What of Einstein's query about whether God could have made a different universe?

In an increasingly technocratic world, how will man keep room for his humanity?

Has modern science left any room for man himself? Any point to human life?

This first-of-its-kind book is a guide through the minefield of false interpretations of science that threaten to destroy all truly human aspirations as well as, ironically, true science itself. Rizzi's book is a fascinating story of where we've been and how we got where we are and most importantly how to get back our center and our intellectual certitude.
